BACK ON TRACK



Jade 17 years old

Jade came to YEP in January to finish high school. She knew she could get back on track with YEP's high school equivalency preparation classes. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic arrived and presented a new set of challenges. Jade had just signed up to take the first section of her HiSET exam in March when testing centers closed and YEP transitioned to virtual learning. She continued taking online classes with YEP, but she didn't have access to a computer. After a few months of doing her best to complete her schoolwork with her phone, Jade received a Chromebook from a generous YEP donor. "I couldn't really manage being on Zoom on my phone anymore," she says. "I'm glad I have the computer now." Through a mix of online and in-person classes, Jade is now getting ready to take her HiSET online at YEP.

Casey 11 years old

Casey started coming to YEP's Afterschool program with his cousin a little over a year ago, and he finds comfort in being at the youth center. Since he started coming to YEP, Casey has made lots of friends and works hard as a member of the YEP Drumline. Even though he knows why it was important to stay home, Casey is happy to be participating in in-person programs again. "At home, I don't really express my feelings," he says. "I don't come out of my shell. But at YEP it's a whole different story. I can have kid dreams here."





Athena 17 years old

As a visual artist, Athena came to YEP to explore her creative instincts. She was a week away from completing her employment readiness training at YEP Works when the stay-at-home order began. Her classes at UNO moved online, and the toy store where she was working closed. After several months at home with little to do, Athena came back to YEP in August as a Communications Intern, where she applies her graphic design skills to projects like this newsletter. "I was really excited to get this opportunity," she says. "People say it's hard to have a job in art, but this has definitely opened up my mind about what kind of jobs I can have in the future."

YOUR SUPPORT IN ACTION

ince March, we have worked to coordinate home internet access for young people so they could continue to participate in group and individual activities remotely. Our instructors offered online classes each week. YEP's mentors provided phone and video mentoring services for each of their mentees. Enrichment staff offered virtual after school and camp sessions via Zoom, and our employment readiness team connected out-of-work youth to available jobs.

This fall, we are focused on addressing educational equity by supporting youth and schools facing the challenges of distance learning. We are doing this by providing flexible, out-of-school resources for youth, including deep mentoring relationships, tutoring, supportive services, alternate educational pathways, creative career exploration, and extracurricular activities.



YEP is an organization founded on the principle of caring for one another. The strength of our work is grounded in our ability to build strong relationships with young people, their families, and the community we serve.

And we could not do any of that without the generosity and commitment of you, our partners and donors.

We anticipate a long and uneven road to recovery once the pandemic finally subsides. But YEP was here for Hurricane Katrina and the aftermath, and we're here now, working with our community to build a future in which all young people have equal access to opportunity.
